



CHAPLAIN SYVERTSON ON FAITH

How important is spirituality in the lives of older adults? As pastor of the St. Luke Homes and Services campus, I have found the faith of our older ones is as important, or maybe more important, than many other things in their lives.

Quite often, the faith learned as a child is one of the last things to go as an older person ages.

To illustrate, let me tell of an experience I had early on in my social work career nearly 30 years ago. "Tillie" was a resident of a nursing



home I worked at. I had known Tillie for over 20 years, as she lived in a neighboring community near where I lived. Tillie, who had Alzheimer's Disease and had lost the ability to speak, was placed in front of a television set one Sunday morning. "Amazing Grace" was being sung during the televised church service, and Tillie perked up and sang all the verses of the hymn without stopping or missing a word. Tillie passed shortly after that morning. But even at the end, she lived the faith that she knew and treasured dearly.

Our Lord tells us, in Matthew 28:20, "Lo, I will be with you always." What we learn as children can be, and is often, carried through to our last days.

May it be so always.
